DESCRIPTION - Childhood and Adolescent Development is a Career Technical Education course, which provides students the opportunity to study the physical, cognitive, language, social, and emotional developmental stages of children from conception through adolescence. Students will study topics such as brain development, families and parenting, prenatal development, developmental milestones from birth through adolescence, health and safety issues, guidance and discipline, cultural diversity, child care, education, children with special needs, and career decisions. This course provides a solid foundation for any career that involves working with children. Project ownership requires monetary contribution of \$40.

PURPOSE - Childhood & Adolescent Development is a course in which students learn and apply theoretical knowledge and practical skills in the development, care, and guidance of children including cultural diversity and careers with children. Students study the developmental ages and stages of children throughout the lifespan. Focus is on the emotional, social, cognitive, and physical development and the influence hereditary and environmental factors. Studies also include child growth and development, safety and emergency procedures, nutrition and health practices, positive interaction and guidance techniques, learning theories, and developmentally appropriate practices and curriculum activities.

COURSE OBJECTIVES - By the end of this course, students will be able:

- To develop an awareness of the physical, emotional, social, and cognitive development of young children.
- Learn to create age appropriate activities for children.
- To develop the student's ability to accept himself/ herself as a worthwhile person, through the care, observation and guidance of children.
- To provide students an understanding of prenatal development, birth, and to develop an awareness of the family and the family life cycle.
- To introduce students to the exploration of career paths in child development.

COURSE TOPICS - The course will cover the following topics: Developmental and Psychological Theories and Theorists, Prenatal Development, Families and Parenting, Brain Development and Developmental Milestones (birth-adolescence), Health and Safety Issues, Guidance and Discipline, Cultural Diversity, and Child Care, Education, Children with Special Needs, and Career Decisions.
