DESCRIPTION - Photojournalism is an introductory photo course in the Arts, Media and Entertainment pathway that exposes students to cutting-edge digital media for storytelling and production. Modeled after an authentic work environment, this course is project-based and highly collaborative. After the initial training period (Phase I and Phase II), which is similar to an internship program, students are graded based upon works produced in small groups. Students will learn all aspects of photography and photojournalism including (but not limited to) pre-production planning, photographing using effective camera techniques (composition, lighting, depth of field, etc.) and digital editing using Adobe Photoshop. Students will publish works online and in student media print and will review works in a whole class environment.

PURPOSE - This interactive, hands-on course will involve exposure to photography techniques and concepts as well as digital media production methods and industry-specific work flow through a variety of formats. In most cases, students will learn by doing and will have access to professional-quality digital SLR cameras, high-end editing software and a range of lenses. Daily activities range from shooting or editing photos to direct instruction from the teacher, online tutorials, guest speakers, field trips and professional resources. Students do not need any kind of photography or journalism experience or any of their own equipment. After successful completion of Photojournalism I, students have the opportunity to take a larger photography role in Whitney High Student Media by entering Publications Production/Design II class to have their work published in the yearbook, magazine and website, or they can expand their technical skills while gaining leadership experience in Photojournalism II, which has a service learning component and puts students in peer teaching situations with beginning photographers.

COURSE OBJECTIVES - By the end of this course, students will be able:

- Students will be prepared to enter the workforce in photography and photojournalism.
- Students will demonstrate proficiency in industry technical standards.
- Students will be able to identify and explain photography career options and job skill requirements.
- Students will demonstrate proficiency in industry-standard safety procedures.
- Students will demonstrate proficiency in customer service skills.

COURSE TOPICS - The course will cover the following topics: Demonstrate basic level understanding of basic file management, Demonstrate basic level understanding of digital image editing (using Adobe Photoshop and Adobe Bridge), Demonstrate basic level understanding of use/application of digital image production equipment, Demonstrate proficiency with image quality and exposure (shutter speed, aperture, ISO), Demonstrate ability to work within a collaborative small student-led group, Demonstrate basic understanding of and application of the following production tasks/steps:

pre-production, production, post-production, publishing, and Demonstrate industry-specific business and entrepreneurial aspects such as promotion, marketing and social media for photography.
